Since 2006, more than 2100 adult educators from 26 states have participated in the LEA program. The participants represent local leaders in both agency-based and community-based organizations. Participating states include: Arizona*, Arkansas*, Georgia*, Idaho, Illinois*, Indiana, Kentucky*, Maine*, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New York*, North Carolina*, Ohio*, Rhode Island*, South Dakota, Tennessee*, Texas*, Vermont, and Wyoming. * These states have sponsored two or more LEA cohorts.
